Me and my family were tested for mercury and our levels were very high. We all had to take a big pill for a one year period to reduce the levels of mercury in our bodies. So, the fish that was supposed to sustain us ended up making us sick. That is why we don't trust developers who want to mine our resources, especially when they say they can protect us against the impacts, and that is why I am against uranium mining on our territory.
