Re: Expansion of the landfill located in Coventry, State of Vermont, in the immediate vicinity of Lake Memphrémagog, a water surface shared with the Province of Québec, Canada.

Following the discussions about the expansion project of the Coventry landfill, the three different levels of government (federal, provincial, and municipal) have been inefficient in taking a decision. In addition, the Lake Memphrémagog is an important source of clean water that supplies a major portion of the population of the Eastern Townships region of Province of Québec, Canada, where my family and I live. This is for this reason that I am writing to you today; I think that all citizens of North America should be equally respected. This is for the good and interest of the future generations to come. Together, we should provide to the future generations our most valuable resource: water.

I have a lot of confidence, Mr. President, that you will do your best to prevent the expansion of the landfill in order to protect our great lake.

The Past does not equal the Future.
